The Structure of This Course

- 3. Be able to write a complete argument, in a structured argument form.

Topics to be covered in this course, the book, any assigned videos include: what is critical thinking, what are the parts of an argument, what is and is not an argument, how arguments can go wrong, testing arguments for validity and invalidity, writing a formal argument.

The Required Text is The Power of Critical Thinking by Lewis Vaughn, 5th edition, 2014, ISBN 978-0199385423, Oxford University Press. Video Material: Various videos will be assigned to watch, and can be seen through YouTube or Google Videos. I will try to provide a link for each video, but if they do not work, the title will be available, if you have another means for watching videos.
